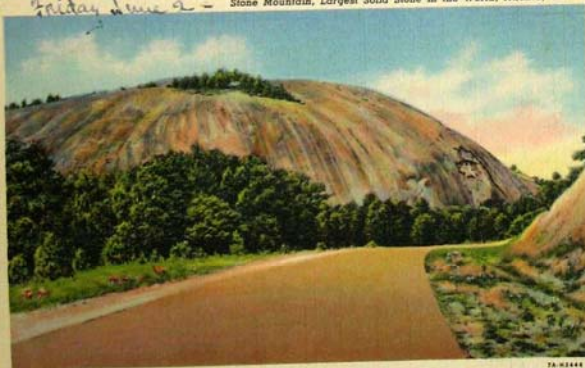

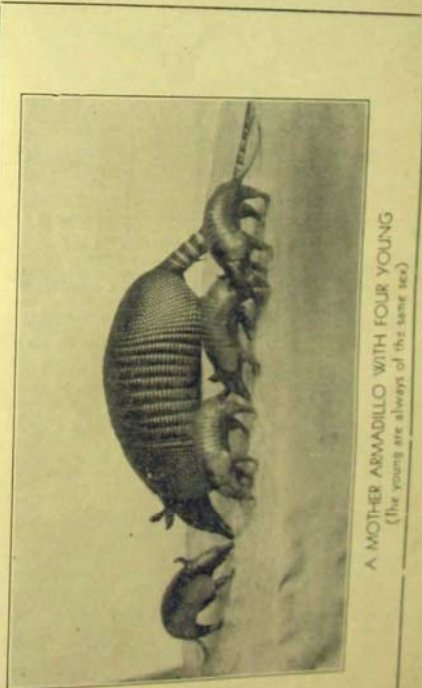
Sunday afternoon drove by Biloxi, Miss on to Gulfport, where at 4 P.M. we stopped at cabins, went swimming in the Gulf.

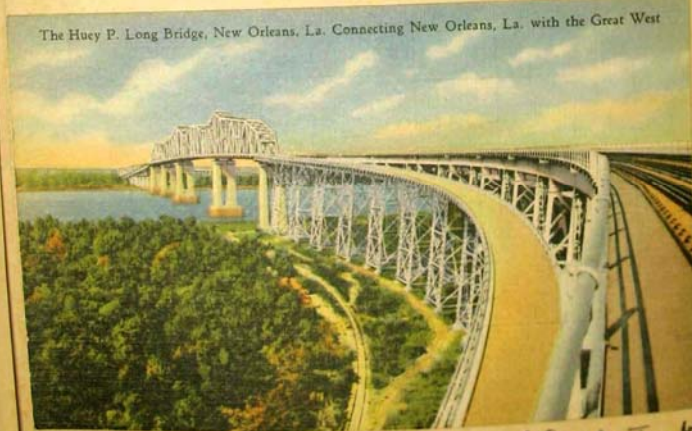

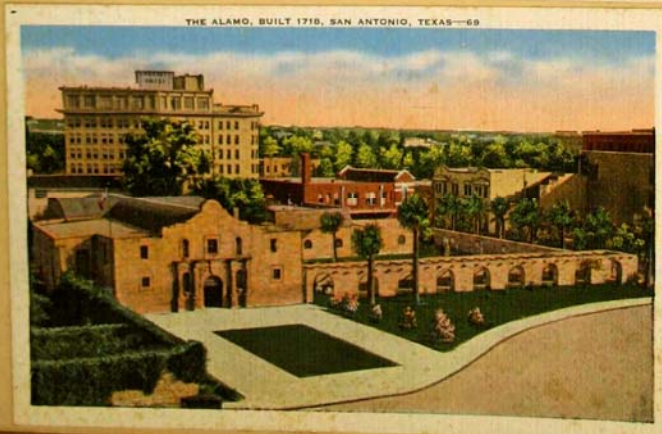

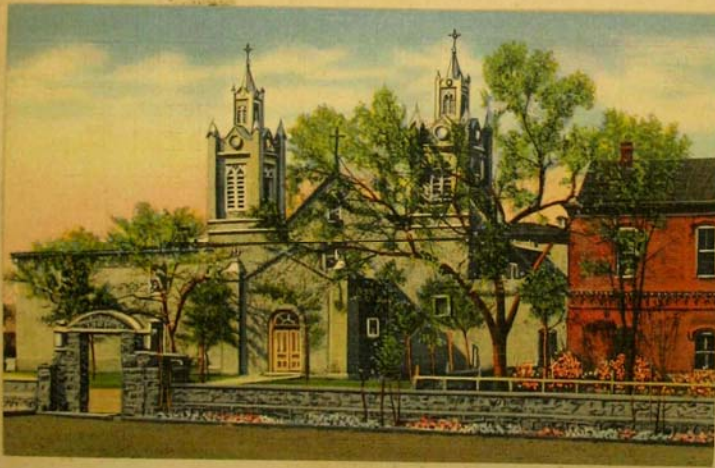

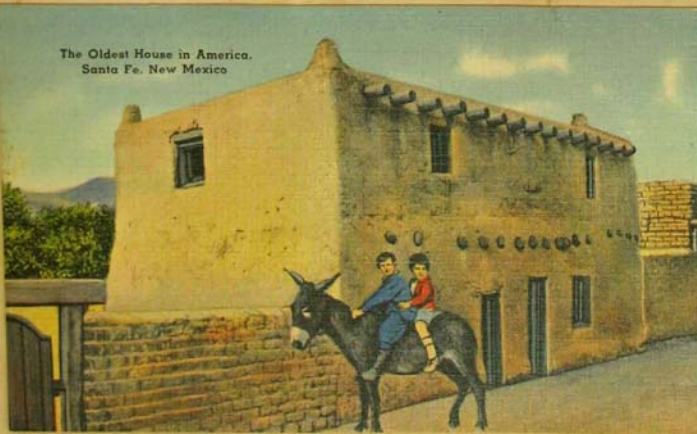

**I**N Coachella Valley, THE DESERT OF PALMS, on the floor of an ancient sea bed, 100 feet below sea level, stands this majestic old palm known as KING SOLOMON.

A rare palm, indeed, for he produces enough pollen to take care of 400 female (date producing) palms, whereas the ordinary male palm can take care of but 50 female palms.

In April, the male flowers are cut and expert hands place the pollen in each female bloom to insure a positive set. Otherwise the planting of a date garden would necessitate the alternate placing of male and female palms so that the wind might carry the pollen.

From August to November, the dates are picked, one by one, as they ripen, taking ten to twelve pickings to complete one bunch of dates. They are thoroughly cleaned, then stored at the right temperature so that we may ship them to you the year 'round.

ANOTHER LANDSCAPE ADDED TO GALLERY

The chief distinction of the Huntington Art Gallery is its collection of English portraits of the eighteenth century, but the few landscapes acquired by the Founder and those added later by the Trustees are of particular interest to students of British painting. Mr. Huntington had chosen examples of Gainsborough, Constable, and Turner, the last being a multicolored Venetian scene, painted about 1837. Recently an earlier and very different landscape by Turner was acquired. 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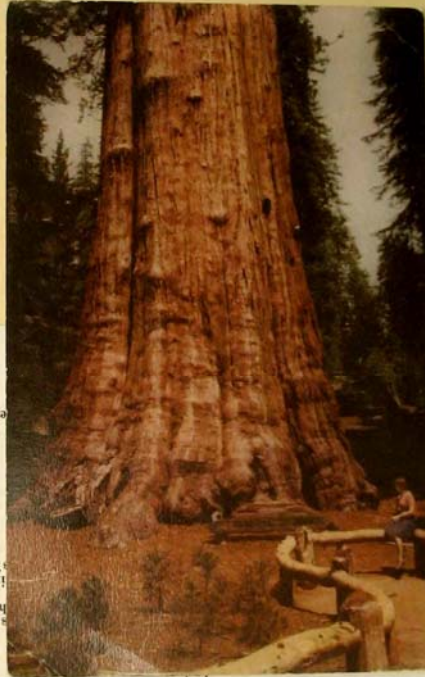

The general appearance of our sky may be compared to that of the 1000's of 1000's of lights of L.L. - as viewed from the L.L. - 900 ft above Holquod.

From this elevation the eye gains immediately the impression of number & of further lights. The observer senses that there must be millions of faint lights invisible at the greater distances. The astronomer who views the sky does not have this advantage for no immediate perception tells him that some of the stars are farther distant than others.

Indeed, it is only in recent generations that there has been a general acceptance of the fact that the distances are not all the same. In 1934 was the centenary of the 1st measurement of the distance of a star.

Dr. Schlessinger, the man who made the greatest individual contribution to a result of his study, and others, today, we know, accurately in some cases, approximately in others. The distances of several 10,000 stars.

Our sun has been called a 'dwarf' star due to the fact that the average naked eye star gives even more light than it does. And the stars slowly shift their positions.

The results which have been collected have been surprising. Despite the fact that many stars give 1000's of times as much light as our sun, the majority are less than one hundredth as luminous.

... If we could travel to the nearest star our sun would seem to dwindle and to become merely one of the brighter stars.

... However most of the stars found near us give less than 1/100 as much light as the sun.

None of the extremely luminous stars we found very close to us. Sirius, the brightest within a dozen light years, gives but 25 times the light of our own sun.

... Our little sample of stars within a dozen light years contains only 3 stars which give more light than our sun.

Procyon is one that gives about 6 times as much. ... There are only 3 very luminous stars in the sphere - It probably would be best to call our sun a dwarf star.

We have, apparently, only one star in our own solar system, but many other stars are not single - 6 of the closest systems are composed of 2 or more stars, instead of one.

Of course, we have no idea whether any of these have planets. The  $\alpha$  Centauri system is the closest of all & has 3 stars. One of these stars is very much like our sun - It gives more light & has about the same size & temperature - The star nearest it is smaller & gives much less light than the sun. These 2 stars move around each other ~~yet~~ far enough a part that each may have its own system of planets yet close enough to supply sunlight to all.

Our nearest star was unknown until 1913. It is so faint too faint to be seen without a telescope -

## FRIENDLY CHAT

The road you are driving has many curves and grades. Keep to the right and exercise the greatest care in avoiding an accident that may result in loss or injury to yourself or others.

Certain roads in the park, mainly in the Giant Forest District, are designated as Scenic Roads. A special limit of 25 miles obtains on these roads as posted by signs.

NEW YORK WORLD'S FAIR NEARS COMPLETION

WORLD'S GREATEST  
CHEMICAL PLANT

The New York World's Fair 1939 hastens toward its opening date on April 30. Weeks before the inaugural ceremonies, the \$155,000,000 exposition is nearly 90 per cent complete. Close to 1,500 exhibitors are finishing their group or individual displays. Sixty-one foreign countries and the League of Nations have taken space in the Hall of Nations and 22 of these are erecting their independent pavilions.

Color flames in scores of gigantic murals and on expanses of wall. Rainbow Avenue is no longer a name; it boasts all the hues of that celestial phenomenon. Imposing sculptured groups lend animation to every vista. Thousands of trees and shrubs await the spring to add their varied tints to the er tire scheme. Finishing touches during the next few weeks will complete the framework of a monster panorama in which imagination need insert only the hundreds of thousands of people who will make the scene extraordinary beyond words.

Viewed from the air the 1216 acre tract is seen in its five major sections—transportation, central exhibit area, foreign, states of the Union, and amusements. The 200 foot Perisphere and the 700 foot Trylon gleam through intricate scaffolding that will remain in place to the last moment. From the base of these two forms, comprising the Theme Center of the exposition and reproduced around the world in a myriad of adaptations, extend the radial highways of the exhibit area. Easily distinguished by its spaciousness, its long pools and cascades, its sculpture and elaborate planting, is the \$60,000,000 Constitution Hall, extending to the Lagoon of Nations, with the United States Federal Building terminating this central axis.

The New York World's Fair 1939 is dedicated to "Building the World of Tomorrow" and on every side is found concrete expression of this purpose. The future is glimpsed in architectural life and mass, in paint and stone and ornament. More specifically, it is found in the exhibits themselves.

Industrial and business organizations are exhausting ingenuity to obtain striking yet enlightening displays. In the Transportation Zone, one make of car can be tested on a highway constructed over and around the roof. The most modern assembly lines will be shown. Tires can be tested over every type of road surface. A giant transport plane can be operated in seemingly full flight and brought to a landing by any experimental visitor. Railroad enthusiasts, old and young, will spend hours before the largest table model of a railroad system ever built, with trains of every description rushing about under the control of block signals, switches and stop lights. The most advanced models of marine transportation are found in the Maritime Building.

A rocketport symbolizes travel in the future. Visitors will obtain the vivid impression of being placed in a rocketship and shot into space on a trip to the moon or Mars.

The main exhibit area is replete with wonders. Ten million volts of artificial lighting will be generated. A diorama 300 feet long will show New York City in unusual detail as a metropolis functioning by day and by night, above

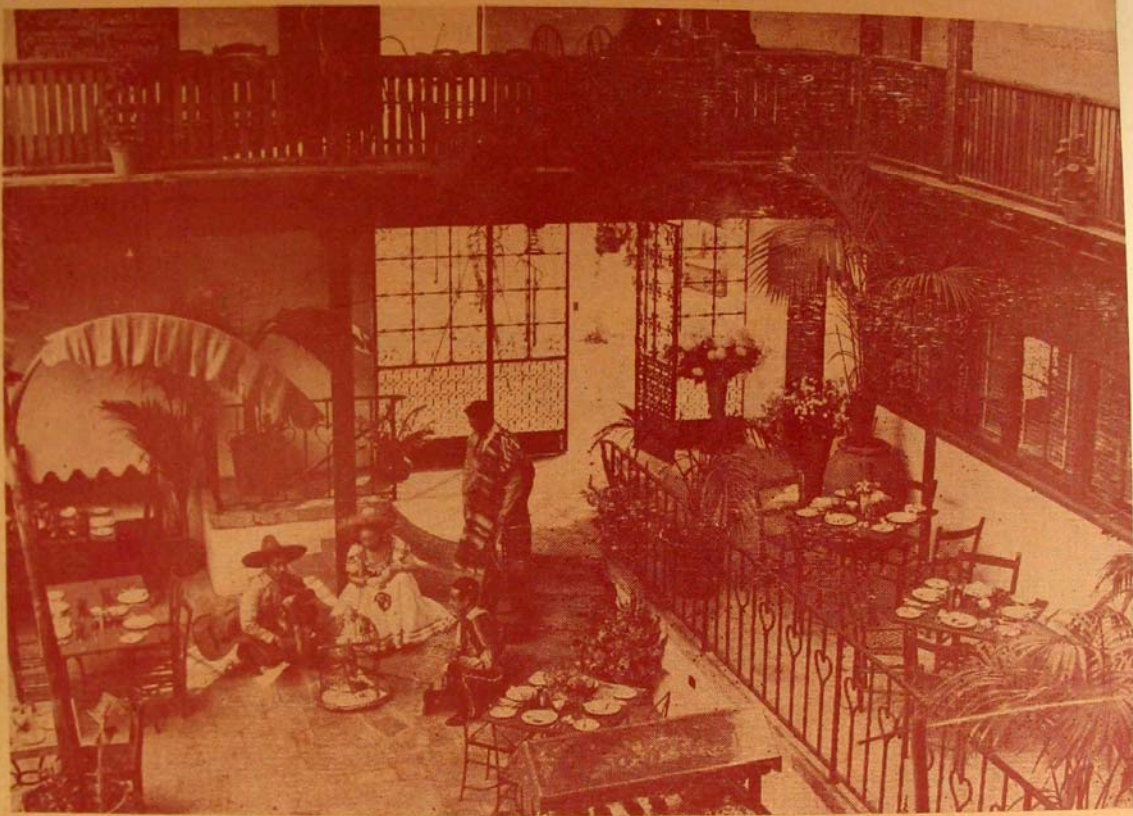
Many of you have had disorders of the stomach and bowels and many others will doubtlessly sometime have similar troubles. Perhaps you would be interested in a trip through these structures which are as a unit called the Alimentary Canal. This chemical plant is made up of a number of units all working successively and cooperatively to manufacture nourishment for the millions of cells of the human body.

We first enter the mouth or receiving room which has 16 pairs of grinders or teeth around its sides for the purpose of crushing the food. In the center of this room is a huge plunger and inspector whose job it is to force food into the next passageway and to inspect all incoming food through many taste buds which are located on its upper surfaces. Beneath this huge plunger are a series of pipes, usually three on each side which bring in mixing fluids from three sets of tanks or glands located in the upper part of the neck. This liquid which is known as saliva serves to lubricate most of the food and it changes the starch to a so-called double sugar.

The lubricated food and sugar are then forced into a tube a little over a foot long through which it passes downward and backward to the next compartment. This passageway has a great amount of muscle running along its sides, some of the muscle running in the same direction and some encircling the tube. This muscle through contraction serves as the conveyor system and moves the food to the next compartment in about six

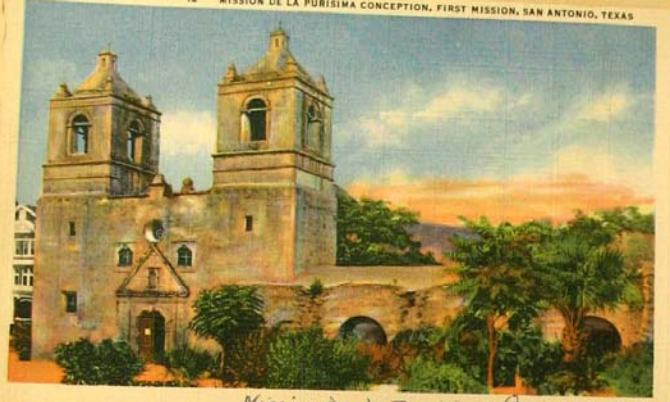

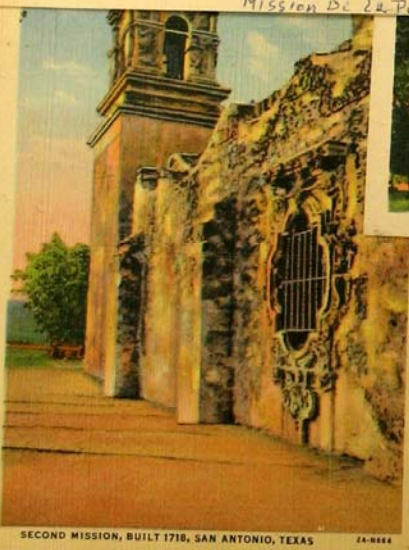

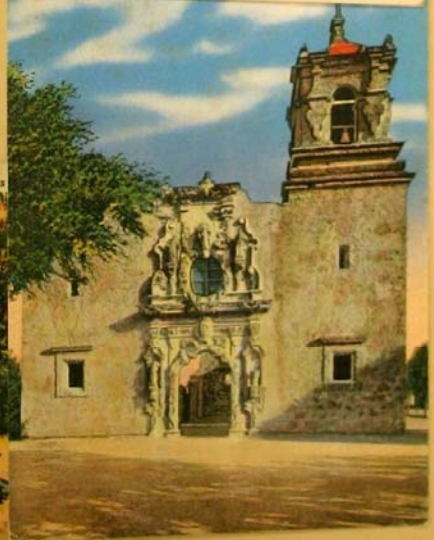
